"Armistice Day" A Call for Peace

WE WILL REMEMBER THEM

Behind the bugles, the poppies, and the pomp and ceremony lies an important meaning to the solemn occasion. Held on the second Sunday in November every year, Remembrance Sunday commemorates the agreement to end fighting during the First World War in 1918. Armistice Day, which also referred to as Remembrance Day, is



November 11 itself. A two-minute silence is often acknowledged.

Remembrance Sunday however, is held on the second Sunday in November and this year will take place on Sunday, November 8th. In England a National Service of Remembrance is held at The Cenotaph in Whitehall in London. Members of the Royal Family and the Government attend the service alongside representatives from the Armed Forces and the public. Another two-minute silence will be held at 11am before a number of wreaths are laid down.

The day remembers the agreement between the Allies and Germany on November 11, 1918, to stop fighting which marked victory for the Allies and defeat for Germany.

It was signed in Compiegne in Northern France and came into effect at 11am. The armistice forced the Germans to evacuate invaded countries and territories within two weeks. They also had to surrender a significant amount of war material, including five thousand guns, 25,000 machine guns, 1,700 planes.

Germany, exhausted by war and with a nation of hungry citizens, reluctantly accepted the terms. Although hostilities continued in some areas, the armistice essentially brought an end to four years of fighting in the First World War.

Many communities lost dearly loved husbands, sons and brothers. My Grandmother lost two of her brothers in this war and it had a profound effect on her family.

We will remember them.

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
